
Thousand Oaks Library Announces 2017 One City One Book Selection

The Thousand Oaks Reads, One City One Book 11th annual book selection for 2017 is News of the World by Paulette liles. This National Book Award Finalist for fiction tells the story of Captain Jefferson Kyle Kidd, in 1870 Texas who travels the state giving live readings to paying audiences hungry for news of the world.

After a "performance", a friend offers Kidd, an elderly widower, a \$50 gold piece to deliver a young orphan girl who had been captured by the Kiowa Indians, to her relatives in San Antonio. Their 400-mile journey south through unsettled territory and unforgiving terrain proves difficult, and at times, dangerous.

Twice orphaned, the girl has forgotten what English she knew and is confused and angry.

At first she tries to escape, refusing to act "civilized." Yet as the miles pass, the two lonely survivors tentatively begin to trust each other, forging a bond that marks the difference between life and death in a treacherous land. News of the World is



a brilliant work of historical fiction exploring the boundaries of family, responsibility, honor and trust. This book is perfect for fans of such classics as True Grit or the John Wayne classic, "The Searchers".




