Thousand Oaks Library: We <u>Are</u> Education.

The Thousand Oaks Library serves as a key agency in supporting the educational and learning needs of our community. The Library is a vital resource for helping young children learn to read and for providing homework help for all grade levels — including homeschooling families or adult learners preparing to take the GED. With a wealth of resources, the Library also aids those seeking to continue their education. Through special events, programs, lectures and other activities, library customers may pursue life-long learning.

Library programs and materials provide opportunities for early childhood development and exposure to important early literacy skills that help children prepare for school and for reading. Thousand Oaks Library Play & Learn Storytimes and other programs for early learners are aimed at developing the individual capacity of young children, teaching early literacy skills and providing information to help parents and caregivers lend vital support.

The Library offers free online homework resources which support CCSS (Common Core State Standards). Students can receive live, online homework help and writing assistance from specialized tutors and utilize skills-building services to help master concepts and build proficiency. Use of the Thousand Oaks Library can impact achievement for students by furnishing them with information and important digital literacy skills.

While public libraries are known as great places to study and a complement to libraries in schools, universities and colleges, the role of technology in our library supporting education is less well-known. In fact, with more and more school libraries and librarian positions being reduced or completely eliminated, students, parents and teachers are relying even more on the public library.



Competitiveness in the 21st century demands that people not stop learning when they leave the classroom. Staying relevant in a rapidly changing workforce will require familiarity with technology, as well as increased skills in successfully navigating information online. The Thousand Oaks Library is part of a seamless web of educational opportunities that brings together trained information professionals and an array of resources that can be utilized inside the library or online 24/7.

The Thousand Oaks Library serves as a location that community members can use to their advantage, regardless of economic or social status or demographic background. The Library helps close the digital divide not only by providing free internet access but also by providing technology classes given by library staff members. The Library also serves the educational needs of the community by providing meeting spaces for special interest groups, students, and community organizations, and acts as a hub for job seekers, business professionals and/or entrepreneurs.

SINGING Everu**CH** Ready to RE

Singing is an incredible tool to teach early language skills needed for future reading abilities. Songs are a wonderful and natural way for children to learn about language and pick up new words. Singing also slows down language so they can hear the different sounds that make up words. This helps when children begin to read printed language. Singing also helps children learn new words and adds to their general knowledge.

Singing (and rhyming) increases children's awareness of and sensitivity to the sounds in words and helps to hear the different sounds that letters can make, slows language down for better comprehension, illustrates the rhythms of reading, and can even teach concepts of development! Think of all of the songs you learned as a child that you still remember as an adult, such as "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star" or the "Itsy Bitsy Spider." Now you can share these with your own children. You may have learned colors, numbers, and other learning concepts through song. The Alphabet song teaches letters. Nursery rhymes are rich in language. Silly songs show kids that language is fun! Your child doesn't care if you can't carry a tune, just sing!

There are some easy and fun things you can do with your child with songs and music. So get singing and help your child get ready to read with these simple SINGING activities!

Tracy Newman to Kick Off 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten Program

Studies have shown that families who start reading aloud to their children at birth help to strengthen their language and listening skills, build and improve their vocabulary, and have increased attention spans — important tools for beginning to learn to read when they enter kindergarten. If you read three books a day to your child, in just one year you'll have read 1,095 books!

I,000 Books Before Kindergarten is a new Library program that encourages all Thousand Oaks families and caregivers to read 1,000 books with their young children before they enter kindergarten.

Learn more about this new program at our 1000 Books Before Kindergarten Kickoff event on Saturday, May 16 at 11:00 a.m. Musician Tracy Newman will perform selections from her album "I Can Swing for Ever" which she collaborated on with her daughter, Charlotte Dean who designed an accompanying coloring book!

Tracy Newman is a television producer, writer and musician. Newman is a founding member of the improvisational

theater troupe The Groundlings (as is her sister, Laraine Newman). She was co-creator and executive producer of the 2001-09 sitcom According to Jim. Tracy's writing credits include Cheers, The Nanny, The Drew Carey Show and Ellen for



which she won an Emmy Award® for the, now famous, "Coming Out" episode.

She also is a singer-songwriter, as well as an original member of The New Christy Minstrels and lead singer of Tracy Newman and The Reinforcements. She is the mother of artist/writer Charlotte Dean, with whom she co-directs the live comedy show *Charlotte's Shorts*.



On June 23, 2014, the American Academy of Pediatrics issued a policy statement that promotes reading aloud to children daily, beginning in infancy. The policy statement recommends that pediatric providers promote early literacy development by: (1) advising parents of the benefits of reading aloud with young children; (2) counseling all parents about shared-reading activities; (3) providing developmentally appropriate books during their visits for all high-risk, low-income young children; (4) using different options to support and promote these efforts; and (5) partnering with other child advocates that support and promote these key early shared-reading experiences.
