





Sharon Markenson, a trained presenter on climate issues, will talk at the

contributes to extreme weather, the effect upon human civilization, and what citizens can do about the problem right now. The narration and slides will clarify the crisis, emphasizing how commitment and action can improve the future.

Ms. Markenson is retired from the Los Angeles Unified School District where she taught secondary English/Language Arts for 35 years. She also taught public speaking and coached competitive forensics. She co-coached the El Camino Real High School Academic Decathlon Team to three national titles and continues to coach the team's speeches. She was trained on climate issues by the Climate Reality Leadership Conference in 2013.

Children & Families



Talking is one of the very first activities that parents can do to help their children eventually become great readers. Talking with children helps them learn oral language, one of the most critical early literacy skills. The experience of self-expression also stimulates brain development, which underlies all learning. Children learn language and other early literacy skills by listening to their parents and others talk. As children hear spoken language, they learn new words and what they mean. They learn about the world around them and important general knowledge. This will help children understand the meaning of what they read. When children listen to spoken words they learn how words sound, the meanings of words and that words can be put together to communicate ideas and information.

Help your child get ready to read with

these simple TALKING activities: Make sure your child has lots of opportunities to talk with you, not just listen to you Respond to what your child says and extend the conversation. You can expand on what your child says. For example, a parent may say, "Yes, we did see a truck like that last week. It's called a bulldozer." Stretch your child's vocabulary. Repeat what your child says and use new words. "You want a banana? That's a very healthy choice." Ask questions and listen to the answers. Have your child tell you what is happening in a story. Talk about books that you've read. Children need to hear a language in order to speak it, so if you do speak multiple languages do so in front of your child and use your first language most often. Blowing bubbles is a great way to strengthen the small muscles in your child's mouth that are important for speech.

Every Child Ready to Read® is a joint project of the Association for Library Service to Children and the Public Library Association (divisions of the American Library Association) in partnership with public libraries to have an even greater impact on early literacy

through an approach that focuses on educating parents and caregivers. As a hands-on, research-based program it is designed to help children prepare to become readers and lifelong learners. The five practices of READING, TALKING, SINGING, WRITING and PLAYING with your child every day help develop the foundational skills that children need to enter school ready to learn. Our Play & Learn Early Literacy Storytimes are a great way to see these practices and skills in action! "



Buddy Ebsen's film career included Breakfast At Tiffany's" with Audrey Hepburn, "Captain January" with Shirley Temple, and "Banjo On My Knee" with Joel McCrea and Barbara Stanwyck among many others. Buddy originally was cast to play the Scarecrow in the "Wizard of Oz", but agreed to play the Tin Man instead. However, the aluminum makeup provoked a toxic reaction, causing the actor to be hospitalized and unable to play the part; hence, the name of the CD. The inclusion of "Somewhere Over The Rainbow" and "If I Only Had A Brain" from the iconic movie are part of the program. Buddy Ebsen probably is best known for his television roles as led Clampett in the "The Beverly Hillbillies" which ran for nine seasons in the 60s and then as "Barnaby Jones" in the 70s.
