





About the Book

In the opening pages of Jamie Ford's debut novel, *Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet*, it's 1986. Henry Lee comes upon a crowd gathered outside the Panama Hotel, once the gateway to Seattle's vibrant Japanese community. The hotel's new owner has made an incredible discovery: suitcases and boxes belonging to 37 Japanese families, who were sent to internment camps during World War II. Henry watches as the owner opens a dusty, brittle Japanese parasol, and this simple act takes old Henry Lee back four decades, to the 1940s, at the height of the war. Amid the chaos of blackouts, curfews, and FBI raids, young Henry and his Japanese-American friend, Keiko, forge a bond of friendship that transcends the prejudices of their Old World ancestors. Their story tells of family pride, innocence, young love, parents and children, jazz clubs, and racial discrimination.

Translated into 25 languages, *Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet* was named an American Booksellers Association top book club choice for Winter 2010.

About the Author

Jamie Ford is the great-grandson of Chinese immigrant Min Chung, who traveled to California in 1865, eventually settling in Nevada where he worked as a miner and took the American name of Ford. Jamie Ford's father grew up during the tumultuous World War II years, a time when many Chinese Americans as well as Japanese Americans found themselves the victims of discrimination. Their stories inspired Ford's writing. "It really started with the 'I Am Chinese' button—this thing my father mentioned wearing as a kid," says the author.

Mr. Ford resides in Montana with his wife and teenage children.
